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GHA School of Health Studies commended

The BSc(Hons) Nursing programme, run collaboratively between the Gibraltar Health Authority School of Health Studies and the Kingston University and St George's, University of London School of Nursing, was successfully re-approved on the 7th June. A panel of senior members of the University and an external expert from the University of Derby were in Gibraltar earlier this week and were extremely impressed by the Gibraltar provision. They commended the strength of the collaboration, the quality of the teaching and support provided to students. Dr Clarissa Wilks, Dean of Learning and Teaching at Kingston University, who chaired the event, said: "The students interviewed by the panel were a credit to the course.
